SCAN: April 2007(4)

Hi all,

After missing the February trip due to work, (thanks to Lynn for filling in) it was nice to once again be on a SCAN trip and on one to such a special place as Heggie's Rock near Augusta GA. 29 of us showed up on that bright and warm Saturday to explore this unique but geological and ecological feature that is similar to our own 40-Acre Rock in Lancaster County but is fortunate to be more protected through the constant stewardship of the Nature Conservancy (TNC) and by a fence and by little advertisement that this site is there. A large nearby quarry was pointed out to us in clear sight of the rock and we were told that this rare place could have met the same fate had it not been purchased through the TNC.

Judy Gordon, a retired botanist from Augusta State University and TNC volunteer, met us with a large plant list and the requisite liability release forms that we needed to sign. Judy lives nearby and knows this site well including every subtlety painted trail marker on the rocks that she used as a sort of puzzle to see if we could find our way and avoid walking over sensitive vernal pools and lichen. Most of us walked with Judy as she described the ecology and history of the remains of this granite volcanic pluton that has been exposed to the daylight and the elements over millions of years (perhaps 300 million years). Judy said one geologist estimated that this deep lava feature had been covered incredibly by at least a mile of overlying rock when it formed and gradually cooled forming large aggregate crystals of feldspar that can be seen throughout the face of the rock. The name Heggie's came from a person who had an old mill in the 1800's which one of Judy's students found nearby.

There has not been much rain here lately so the plant life was not as robust and green as in some years but we did see a lot of crimson colored stonecrop, fragile pool sprite and a very rare patch of quillwort as well as yellow wooly ragwort. Tom and Mary and others as usual thoroughly documented as much of the plant life as they could and will be in the upcoming species list. Judy showed many of us after lunch the additional 30 acres (to the original 90 acres) that TNC had recently acquired. Most of that buffer land is wooded and consists of upland pine and oak with streams running through the area. Speaking of oak there are a number stunted of water oaks surviving on the rock face taking advantage of places where soil was gradually deposited in large cracks. One tree Judy said was estimated to be 85 years old but was not more than twenty feet high.

Many species of lichen predominate on the rock (very, very slow but persistent soil generators) and are being documented by TNC staff. Beyond the surprise of a large black rat snake sunning high at almost eye level on the unleafed branched of a buckthorn as we walked up the trail to the fence, animal life was not abundant today and Judy said that birding is not always that abundant in this particular habitat. We did see many Falcate Orangetip butterflies and some species of dragonflies which when the pools have more water use them as breeding areas. We did hear many Tufted Titmouses and some early Northern Parulas in the woods. Over all it was a great day to see "the rock" and we surely thank Judy for what she does in protecting this unique ecological niche and for guiding us today.

After dinner in Augusta at the Athens cafe, some us finished the day by seeing some rare relict Trilliums that Gordon Murphy had found out from DNR at of all places, the SC east bound I-20 rest stop near the Savannah River. Also Johnny Hardaway showed five of us a place where the SCNPS had relocated some other trilliums near exit One on I-20.

Our next trip is in Spartanburg County and led by Jan Ciegler who did find a fair number of her favorite insects (beetles) at Heggie's rock. Look forward to seeing you there for another spring SCAN trip.


Marvin Jackson's Place Spartanburg County, SC April 28, 2007 (Jan Ceigler)

We have been invited to investigate Marvin Jackson's Place, an extensive piece of private land bordering on the South Tyger River, where SCAN has not gone before. Included are two large ponds, an extensive marsh with nesting great blue herons and wood ducks, beech forest, and planted grasslands. Birding should be exceptional, and the wetlands should hold plentiful insects, frogs, and aquatic plants.

The property is gated, and the code will be available at the gate any time between 9:30 am and 10:30 am.

Latecomers will be out of luck, as the gates will be locked at 10:30 am. If you know you will be late, call Jan Ciegler (803-796-2862) before 10 pm Friday night for the gate code. Bring the usual lunch, water, insect repellant, and sunscreen; boots for wading are recommended to let you reach the less accessible trails, but there are plenty of dry roads. We will not use the Jackson's rest facilities, but there are several places at the I-26/US-221 intersection.

Directions: To reach the property, take I-26 southwest of Spartanburg to Exit 28 (US-221), and turn south onto US-221. Drive just past the water tower, 3.7 miles, and turn right onto Old Switzer Road. Travel to the "T" at the end of the road (0.5 miles) and turn right onto Old Spartanburg Highway. Go 0.3 miles and turn left onto Wildflower Lane, a dirt road. Go straight ahead to the gate, and punch the code into the keypad on a post at the left; gate will open and close



automatically. When leaving the property, do the same at the keypad inside the gate.

SCAN 2007 Fieldtrip Data: dates and abbreviated site descriptions

Apr 28, Jackson's Place, Spartanburg County, Northern Region, Jan Ciegler; see newsletter.

May 26, Pacolet Falls, Polk County, NC, Western Region, Eva/Sam Pratt: Double waterfall and beautiful array of woodland plants. Private property of Mrs. Nancy Barnett; very near Pearson's Falls.

Jun 23, Rich Woods (along Enoree River), Laurens County, Western Region, Eva/Sam Pratt; Site harbors a typical Piedmont forest, and the floodplain bordering the Enoree River; abundant plant and animal life; within Sumter National Forest.

Jul 28, Blue Wall Passage of the Palmetto Trail, Spartanburg/Greenville County, Western Region, Eva/Sam Pratt; The trail is 3.2 miles one-way, passes the Twin Ponds at the base of Hogback Mountain, and then passes through dense forest. The trail is gradual most of the way, but rises steeply near the end. Beautiful scenery abounds. One of the crown jewels of the state's 425-mile "Mountains-to-the-Sea" Palmetto Trail.

Aug 25, Mepkin Abbey, Berkeley County, Southern Region, Mike Turner; On the east bank of the Cooper River, the monastery has been instrumental in bringing attention to the plight of stewardship and protection of the remaining wild lands along the river. The grounds began as the Mepkin Plantation, home of American patriot Henry Laurens, and in the 1930's became the country estate of Time magazine publisher Henry Luce and Clare Boothe Luce.

Sep 22, Lynchburg Savanna Heritage Preserve, Lee County, Central Region, Jerry Bright; A premier example of the biologically diverse and imperiled longleaf pine savanna habitat. Additionally, has extensive pocosin habitat, as well as pond-cypress ponds. A botanist's dream, with 10 species of carnivorous plants, as well as numerous species of showy orchids and other savanna wildflowers.

Oct 27/28, Sandhills National Wildlife Refuge and Cheraw State Park, Chesterfield County, Overnight to Cheraw State Park, Northern Region, Jan Ciegler; The refuge features a great array of habitats: freshwater aquatics, longleaf pine forest, open fields, and other classic sandhills habitats. The refuge has 30 man-made lakes & ponds. 190 bird species, 42 mammal species, 41 reptile species, and 25 amphibian species find refuge here. Rare species are numerous. The park exhibits many classic sandhills habitats, some quite remote and open for exploration. Extensive longleaf pine forest, red-cockaded woodpeckers, and significant wetlands with stands of Atlantic white cedar trees. The rare plant, *Hudsonia* (golden heather), inhabits the area, as does pixie moss, and others. The park was built as an CCC project from the 1930's. Nearby are Sandhills State Forest and Cheraw Fish Hatchery.

Nov 17, Little Pee Dee State Park and Little Pee Dee State Park Bay Heritage Preserve, Dillon County, Eastern Region, Gordon Murphy; The park's namesake river, and its floodplain, are the main attraction. The preserve is a natural, undisturbed Carolina Bay, and accompanying bay forest and pocosin. This Carolina Bay ranks number 21 in the top 36 bays selected for protection.

Dec 8, Lafarge Quarry, Dorchester County, Southern Region, Mike Turner; This quarry cuts 80' through the Harleyville Formation (Late Marine Eocene) and the Cross Formation (Middle Marine Eocene). This is the deepest mine in eastern SC. Waiting to be found are excellent specimens of fossil shark teeth, bones, brachiopods, etc.
