Hello Everyone,

We enjoyed a break in the heat last month when we visited Landsford Canal State Park. With temperatures in the low 90s and the shady trails, courtesy of the beautiful tree canopy, it was a pleasant day. As we were preparing to embark on our hike along the Catawba River, we were joined by a new SCAN member John Ghent, who is a Park volunteer. John shared his knowledge about the historic aspects of the Park as well as tidbits about the natural environment. In typical SCAN fashion, we all moved off down the trails at our own individual paces.

The trails were relatively flat which is what you would expect for a trail on the floodplain of the river. Where patches of sunlight hit the forest floor, wildflowers such as flowering spurge, butterfly pea, spiderwort, Asiatic day flower, and white crownbeard were blooming. Cardinal flower, virgin's bower, and hog peanut were blooming along the river. But the true sign that summer is on its way out was evidenced by the fruits that could be seen hanging from the trees and shrubs. Fruiting trees and shrubs included persimmon, Carolina silver bells, American spicebush, beautyberry, muscadines, and buckeyes were loaded with fruit. Black walnuts littered the ground in some locations.

This month's trip will be to the Lisa Matthews Memorial Bay in Bamberg County. Next month we have a President's Special planned for the 9th of October. We will visit Shealy's Pond Heritage Preserve in Lexington County. I recently visited Shealy's Pond for the first time in many years and really had a great time. I had forgotten how tall and straight the Atlantic white cedars are in the preserve.

Lisa Matthews Memorial Bay Bamberg County, September 25, 2010, 10:30AM

On September 25th we will visit Lisa Matthews Memorial Bay just south of Bamberg on Hwy 301. This bay, owned and managed by the S.C. Native Plant Society (SCNPS), contains Canby's dropwort (*Oxypolis canbyi*), a federally listed plant. SCNPS has done much since 2005 to remove loblolly pine and other weedy species such as sweet gum to stop the encroachment on the dropwort's population. Water levels can reach a meter in most years so one could normally expect to see other wetland species such as southern cutgrass, maidencane, blueflag, purple bladderwort, and pool coreopsis, if we had had some much needed rain. Although the preserve is only 52 acres in size there is quite a bit of variety in the forest at higher elevations including *Ilex myrtifolia* (yellow fruited like those at Cathedral Bay) and *Burmannia* sp. to name a couple of interest. Go to www.scnps.org/activities for links to five or six articles about this bay. All of us have some interest in habitat restoration so this visit will be a good education in responsible management.

There are no restroom facilities at the Preserve.

The bay is located approximately 8 miles south of Bamberg on the west side of Hwy 301. From Bamberg head south on US 601/301. When the road splits, veer right on 301. You will cross two creeks. After crossing the second creek, look for a low area with cypress on the right side of the road (the bay), followed by a clear cut area. At the end of the clear cut area is a hunt club gate with a small parking area outside. We will park here but **do not block the gate**.

There is an excellent BBQ joint just north of Bamberg on Hwy. 301. Jerry Bright can also attest to the quality as he and I visited there some time back with the Butterfly Society. The name escapes me..... We'll just follow our noses.

President's Special Shealy's Pond Heritage Preserve Lexington County, October 9, 2010, 10:30AM

Shealy's Pond Heritage Preserve is a 62 acre site on an old mill pond. We will walk the trail that leads through sandhill habitat and an Atlantic white cedar bog wetland along the pond edge. When I visited recently, the trail through the bog was pretty wet so if you do not want to get your feet wet, wear appropriate foot wear (I did it in a pair of Crocs). Depending on the weather conditions, we may want to wade out into the pond to get a better look at some of the carnivorous plants including sundews and pitcher plants. These can also be seen along the trail without wading. For those that would prefer to paddle the pond, kayaks and canoes can be launched from the dam of the pond.

According to DNR's website, notable plants that occur in the Preserve include Rayner's blueberry, white beakrush, swaying bulrush, Collin's sedge, wooly-berry, northern burmannia, Pickering's breweria, yellow pitcher plant, purple pitcher plant, sweet pitcher plant, three species of sundew, and the black water snake. There are no restroom facilities or drinking water at the Preserve. Plan on packing your lunch for eating on the trail. If you have trouble finding the Preserve and need to contact me, you can call my cell phone (803-530-2395).

Directions from Columbia: Take SC Highway 302/Edmund Highway south past Columbia Metropolitan Airport. Turn right, at Exxon Gas Station, on Boiling Springs Road (S-32-279) before Highway 302 merges with Hwy 6. Go west on Boiling Springs Road for approximately two miles. The preserve's parking lot is located on the left hand side of the road.
