The Earth is tilting, dawn is getting earlier, the seasonal rains have started and the Newberry Burrowing Crayfish in my side yard are surfacing, building their mud pellet chimneys in the wettest areas. Regardless of what the Pennsylvania whistle pig says, Spring is coming!

Last month we started the year with an amazing Director's Special to the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge. We saw some lifer birds (for me – Black-Bellied Whistling Ducks are now in the bag!), and I got an intriguing series of photos of a Grey-Headed Swamp Hen moseying by the suspicious batch of stripes and disembodied eye of a American Bittern in the marsh grass. I believe they were only a foot away from one another and the Swamp Hen didn't appear to notice the Bittern, although the Bittern was clearly watching the Swamp Hen. Animal behavior at its finest.

Later in the month we had a successful Annual Meeting at Saluda Shoals. We had five great speakers, a PotLunch with great food, and an interesting business meeting. Stay tuned to our monthly newsletter to see how SCAN is doing!

This month we have a tempting trip to Beaufort County to Widgeon Point Preserve. For folks further upstate, this coastal area will likely be warmer than our home turf (which looks like it might get a dip in temperatures again) but also sports a walkable circuit trail for anyone who is having a little trouble getting around at this time. I encourage everyone to make the trip!

We have a number of great trips coming up this year and I hope to see more members on the trails. We are asking participants to sign a liability waiver this year for trips, but that can be handled once you get to the meetup site. We want to protect our organization as well as ourselves and nature.

Last Month: Savannah NWR

Last month Ron Ahle led a bonus Director's Special to Savannah National Wildlife Refuge. By sheer coincidence, two rare birds cropped up on the Refuge over the holiday season: Cave Swallow (*Petrochelidon fulva*) and Grey-headed Swamphen (*Porphyrio poliocephalus*). SCAN managed to see (and photograph) both! Both species were new for SCAN's database and treat for us to see.

We were also treated to some other amazing bird watching highlights like an American Bittern (*Botaurus lentiginosus*) wiggling through the reeds, an Orange-crowned Warbler (*Leiothlypis celata*) scarfing down cattail seeds, a pair of Virginia Rails (*Rallus limicola*) darting through the marsh, Harriers (*Circus hudsonius*) galore, and an abundance of ducks. The Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks (*Dendrocygna autumnalis*) were particularly prolific and were loitering on one roadway in the hundreds!

The only downside was the cutting wind, biting cold, and nonexistent sun. But when has a touch of hypothermia every stopped us SCANners from soodling?

Widgeon Point Preserve

BEAUFORT COUNTY, SC 43 Okatie Hwy, Okatie, SC 29909 GPS COORDINATES: 32.37223, -80.79997 February 22, 2025 | 10:30am to 4:00pm

<u>Widgeon Point Preserve</u> is a 162-acre passive nature park protected by the Open Land Trust in 2007 and managed by Beaufort County. It is one of many properties protected by funding from the Beaufort County Rural and Critical Lands Program.

The Preserve is located just off HWY-170 on an Island in Port Royal Sound in between Beaufort and Okatie, SC. This low-lying coastal property is home to barrier island, salt marsh, and salt flat plant communities. The Preserve has several brackish wetland systems including one large brackish pond, which host a diversity of shorebirds and wading birds. Views of the Broad River and Sound could also yield waterfowl and other coastal water birds.

The trails on the property are well maintained and level, but may be wet in areas following particularly high tides. The Preserve is directly on Port Royal Sound and may be windy the day of our trip. So please dress accordingly.

DIRECTIONS (GPS:32.37223, -80.79997)

FROM THE I-26 / I-95 INTERCHANGE

- Drive approx. 57 miles south on I-95
- At mile marker 28, turn left onto SC-462
- Drive approx. 15 miles and turn left onto Snake Rd
- Drive approx. 3 miles to the end of Snake Rd and turn left at the light onto Okatie Highway (SC-170)
- Drive approx. 4.3 miles and Widgeon Point Preserve will be on your right

FROM DOWNTOWN CHARLESTON

- Drive approx. 53.5 miles south on US HWY-17
- Turn left onto US HWY-21 at Gardens Corner
- Drive approx. 12 miles and turn right at the light to stay on US HWY-21
- Drive approx. 1.2 miles and turn right at the light onto Okatie Highway (SC-170)
- Drive approx. 5.6 miles and Widgeon Point Preserve will be on your left

We will meet in the main parking area. There are restrooms on site.

Tom Austin, Southern Regional Director, and Destiney Rains, Passive Parks Naturalist for Beaufort County, will lead the day's trip.
